

- 1 **368A-429 Decatur Street Block Association: \$2,000** to continue a block beautification campaign through a community event to involve block residents in maintaining trees and installing planters.
- 2 **500 Hancock Block Association: \$2,500** to improve the appearance of the block by planting flowers and foliage in tree wells, building tree well guards, and installing planter barrels.
- 3 **Bainbridge Circle Block Association: \$2,500** to improve the appearance of the block by planting flowers and foliage in tree wells, building tree well guards, and installing planter barrels.
- 4 **Bainbridge Homeowners and Tenants Block Association: \$1,500** to promote respect for and care of plants and trees in the neighborhoods of Bed-Stuy and Stuyvesant Heights.
- 5 **Bed-Stuy CSA*: \$2,500** to increase the availability of fresh, locally-grown produce for low-income residents by giving them interest-free loans to purchase co-op shares.
- 6 **Brooklyn International High School Art Club: \$2,500** to beautify the school by painting hallway murals that reflect the diversity of the student body, and to serve as a resource for student artists.
- 7 **Brooklyn Young Filmmakers Center: \$2,500** to conduct a community outreach campaign to publicize the group's work and to involve residents in their projects, including filmmaking and youth mentoring.
- 8 **Bushwick CSA*: \$2,500** to establish a revolving loan fund to build up membership among low-income residents, and to organize a trip to the CSA's partner farm to increase understanding of the food growing process.
- 9 **Clinton Hill CSA*: \$500** to launch an outreach campaign to increase membership among low-income residents of Clinton Hill, Bed-Stuy, and Fort Greene.
- 10 **Community Research Class at the Academy for Environmental Leadership: \$2,250** to raise awareness of health issues affecting Bushwick residents by creating community "health" maps.
- 11 **Concord Village Compost Committee: \$2,750** to provide residents of Downtown Brooklyn with convenient access to composting sites.
- 12 **East New York United Concerned Citizens: \$1,575** to help seniors travel regularly to local barber shops and beauty parlors for social interaction and engagement.
- 13 **Public School 46 Environmental Group: \$1,100** to examine and improve soil quality in the school garden, run a composting project, and produce an herb garden.
- 14 **Fort Greene CSA*: \$2,750** to establish a revolving loan fund to increase membership among low-income residents, and to organize a trip for CSA members to their partner farm.
- 15 **Freegan Bike Workshop: \$2,750** to run a summer-long "build-a-bike" program to teach bike building, repair and maintenance skills to youth in Bed-Stuy.
- 16 **Front Line Tour Brooklyn Chapter: \$1,250** to organize "Brooklyn Meet and Greet," a festival that uses performance art to bring together neighbors of various backgrounds to strengthen a sense of community across Brooklyn neighborhoods.
- 17 **Garden Friends of Los Sures: \$2,000** to turn an abandoned lot in South Williamsburg into a community garden and to encourage its use as a gathering space for neighbors.
- 18 **Hattie Carthan Community Garden: \$2,650** to build a greenhouse to extend food production into the winter and offer more food options in Bed-Stuy.
- 19 **Hollenback Community Garden: \$2,000** to build a permanent composting system to accommodate the huge amount of green waste that it receives.
- 20 **Los Bomberos de Brooklyn: \$2,465** to celebrate African-Puerto Rican heritage through a two-week festival that involves dance, music, mask-making, food demonstrations, a community forum, and a procession from the Lower East Side across the Williamsburg Bridge to a community garden in Williamsburg.
- 21 **Madison Street Block #2 Association: \$1,000** to improve the appearance of the block by installing tree guards, and planting trees and flowers in the tree pits.
- 22 **Madison Street Block #3 Association: \$1,000** to beautify the block and promote neighborhood pride by installing planters.
- 23 **New York Teens Empowering More People Onward: \$800** to strengthen youth writing and project completion skills by publishing a youth-written and edited community newsletter, and to hold events that bring together youth and adults in Flatbush.

- 24 **Olympus Garden Club: \$1,000** to work with students at Prospect Heights Campus High School to clean and beautify the area around a historic time capsule.
- 25 **Public School 29 Flower Power Team: \$600** to beautify an outside area of the school by painting murals and planting flowers.
- 26 **Public School 298 Science Club Girls:** To reduce paper waste through a paper recycling project, by shredding recycled paper and using it to fill cushions that they give to teachers.
- 27 **Public School 321 PTA: \$2,000** to improve a seating area in front of the school used by classes and students eating lunch, and to beautify the school's main entrance.
- 28 **Public School 52 Third Grade: \$1,000** to bring together students, their families, and teachers to redesign the school's front entrance and make it more welcoming.
- 29 **PURPOSE: \$1,800** to run an after-school program for youth in Flatbush, Canarsie, and Crown Heights.
- 30 **Plaza del Mercado Unido: \$1,750** to provide information on sidewalk vending rights to immigrant vendors and to alleviate friction between street vendors and businesses in Sunset Park.
- 31 **Prospect Lefferts Gardens Arts: \$850** to involve neighborhood artists in leading children's crafts and performance art workshops in Prospect Park.
- 32 **Sheepshead Bay Plumb Beach Civic Association: \$3,000** to transform a section of the Belt Parkway into a shady garden oasis for residents of Sheepshead Bay, Plumb Beach, and Jamaica Bay.
- 33 **Stuyvesant North Block Association: \$1,000** to beautify their block by adding and maintaining plants and trees.
- 34 **Sunset-Ridge Waterfront Alliance: \$1,200** to organize "Greening the Ridge," a day-long festival in Bay Ridge to teach adults and children how to develop green communities and to recognize schools that have "gone green."
- 35 **Good Shepard Community Garden: \$450** to organize a harvest day to bring youth into the community garden to educate them about food and healthy cooking and eating.
- 36 **P.S. 133 Green Team: \$1,500** to beautify the school's front entrance with native trees and shrubs, and to create a small garden for early childhood grades to grow their own vegetables.
- 37 **Trees Not Trash: \$1,000** to encourage youth in Bushwick to become involved in their community garden and to learn about food and healthy eating.
- 38 **YACOTA (Youth and Children of the Arts): \$1,400** to create an exhibition called "ode to our youth" to bring together student and local artists and address community issues in Crown Heights.
- 39 **Tilder Block Association: \$1,000** to install tree guards and repair tree pits on their block, and to create seating in their community garden.
