



- 1** **142nd Street Block Association: \$2,000** to create a community health kiosk to distribute information about rat abatement and pest control.
- 2** **Buyers and Renters United to Save Harlem: \$1,000** to preserve affordable and safe housing by conducting seminars on tenants rights and through the creation of a consortium of organizations across Harlem that support tenants rights.
- 3** **Central Harlem CSA*: \$2,750** to develop a renewable revolving loan fund to increase membership among low-income community members.
- 4** **Chelsea CSA*: \$1,000** to establish a year-round presence in Chelsea and increase outreach to recruit low-income members.
- 5** **Chinatown Youth Initiatives: \$1,500** to organize "Chinatown Beautification Day," a youth-planned and led project that engages high school students to clean up the streets of Chinatown.
- 6** **Cocolart: \$2,650** to work with community artists and youth at Washington Heights schools to beautify school bathrooms with murals.
- 7** **Cocolart - Math-a-thon: \$2,000** to organize classes from Mirabal sister schools, which participate in activities connecting their math curriculum with different parts of High Bridge Park in Washington Heights.
- 8** **Concrete Safaris: \$1,000** to enable local youth to create a design for and restore an eroded garden space in the center of a NYC Housing Authority building complex in East Harlem.
- 9** **Friends of Payson Avenue Youth Council: \$1,500** to increase youth understanding of and engagement in local politics through meetings with elected representatives, participation in community board meetings, and workshops. Youth are empowered to select the most critical issues facing their community and to develop an action plan to address the issues.
- 10** **Grand Street Guild Tenants Association: \$2,000** to build the capacity and sustainability of their tenants association to preserve affordable housing in the Lower East Side.
- 11** **Grassroots Farmer's Market: \$650** to create a tent of flowers at the local farmers market, serving as a lounge for neighborhood residents and providing a vending space for sale of local flowers.
- 12** **Hooked on East River Park: \$1,500** to strengthen community interest in and use of East River Park, and to raise awareness among Lower East Side residents about the importance of open space.
- 13** **La Perla Garden: \$800** to install a paved pathway, wheelchair ramp and patio in the community garden.

- 14 **like|rice communications: \$1,500** to host a series of community dinner conversations called "Potluck Politickin'" on various local and global topics that affect community members. The conversations are filmed and shared with a wider audience.
- 15 **Movement for Justice in el Barrio: \$2,610** to conduct a citywide meeting of tenants groups to develop strategies to preserve low-income housing and halt displacement of low-income people by landlords and real estate developers.
- 16 **New Amsterdam Public: \$2,000** to establish an open market for Lower Manhattan residents by rejuvenating a currently vacant area of the South Street Seaport.
- 17 **NYC Grassroots Media Coalition: \$2,000** to organize a series of three networking events to bring together media makers and community leaders as a way to increase grassroots participation from diverse communities in independent media.
- 18 **Public School 33 Environmental Club: \$1,000** to hold a poster contest for third and fourth grade students to generate excitement for a recycling project.
- 19 **Public School/Intermediate School 50 Green Thumbs Up: \$1,000** to create a garden in the school playground and provide hands-on experience to students and families about gardening and the value of greenery.
- 20 **Parlor Entertainment: \$2,300** to hold live, free jazz concerts in Harlem and to provide tenants rights information to rent stabilized and rent control tenants in Harlem and Washington Heights.
- 21 **Roosevelt Park Community Coalition: \$1,100** to organize an event celebrating the African heritage of the Lower East Side and to strengthen M'Finda Kalunga Community Garden's connection with the African Burial Ground.
- 22 **Stanton Street CSA*: \$1,050** to provide a revolving loan program for low-income residents in and around the Lower East Side and East Village.
- 23 **Art of Community: \$1,000** to support an inter-generational project that documents the history of Harlem from the perspective of neighborhood residents through workshops that promote active listening and sharing of personal stories.
- 24 **Riverside Oval Association: \$550** to support public oral history sessions in which long-term residents of selected buildings recount events in the history of the building and interact with an audience.
- 25 **West Side Neighborhood Alliance: \$1,000** to increase membership among Spanish-speaking residents of Chelsea, Hells Kitchen, and the Upper West Side through bi-lingual community forums.
- 26 **West 128th Street Block Association: \$1,500** to install and run a community information kiosk for residents in West Harlem in cooperation with other block associations.
- 27 **West 135th Street Block Association: \$500** to hang holiday lights and decorations to beautify the neighborhood and promote community pride in Harlem.
- 28 **West Harlem Action Network Against Poverty: \$3,000** to support the creation of a small entrepreneurial program to sell inexpensive tote bags in West Harlem.
