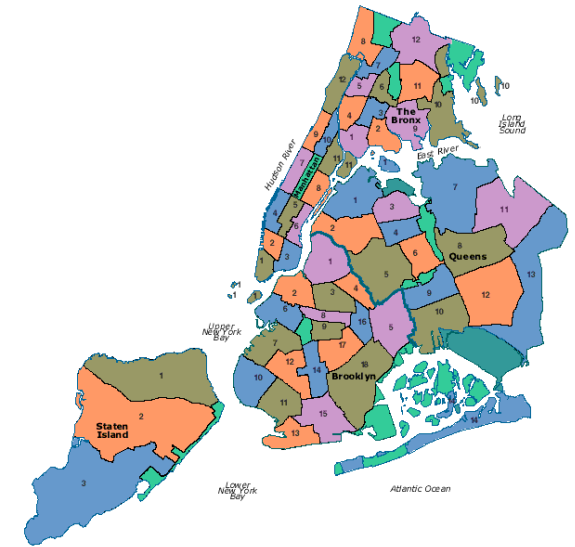

YOUR COMMUNITY BOARD

Community Boards play an important role in improving the quality of life for all New Yorkers, but many people don't know about them or how they operate. CAU urges you to take a moment to learn how your Community Board can help you, and how you may be able to help your Community Board.

COMMUNITY BOARDS

Membership– Community Boards are local representative bodies. Each of the 59 Boards has 50 unsalaried members. Members are nominated by the community's Council Members and appointed by the Borough Presidents. Board members must reside, work or have a specific interest in the community they represent.

Meetings– Community Board meetings occur once a month and are open to the public. At these meetings, Board members discuss community concerns and give residents the opportunity to express their opinions. Boards also regularly conduct public hearings on the City's budget, land use and other related items.

Committees– Committees do most of the planning and work on issues that are raised at Community Board Meetings. Each Community Board establishes its own structures and procedures for committees, and non-Board members may apply to join them.

THE BOARD'S RESPONSIBILITIES

Boards take on an advisory role in dealing with land use and zoning matters, the City budget, municipal services and many other issues related to their community's welfare.

Land Use and Zoning Matters– Community Boards must be consulted on the placement of most municipal facilities in their community and may initiate their own plans for growth and improvement. Changes in zoning regulations must come before the Board for review, and the Board's position is considered in the final decision.

City Budget– Community Boards review the budgetary needs of their neighborhoods and meet with City agencies to make recommendations in the City's budget process.

Other Community Concerns– Any problem that affects part or all of a community, from deteriorating housing to traffic, is an issue for the Community Board to address.

Limitations– Although the Community Board, District Manager and Board staff serve as advocates and service coordinators for residents, they do not have authority over City agencies and officials. Nevertheless, Boards are usually successful in solving problems through dialogue with other government entities.

THE DISTRICT MANAGER AND DISTRICT OFFICE

The District Manager and District Office work to improve the delivery of City services to their community and promote the quality of life for their residents.

Each Community Board is led by a District

Manager who establishes an office, hires the staff and oversees Board functions. While the main responsibility of the Board office is to receive and resolve complaints from community members, they also take on other duties such as

processing permits for block parties and street fairs. Many Boards even choose to provide additional services and manage special projects, including organizing tenants associations, coordinating neighborhood cleanup programs and more, depending on community needs.
